



From late fall 2024 through June 2025, the Spokane University District participated in an <u>early learning</u> and care needs assessment led by Community-Minded Enterprises in partnership with Spokane Workforce Development and local universities.

According to the Washington Department of Children, Youth and Families, an estimated 1,068 children in the 99202 zip code—where the University District is located—need childcare. The study drew on a survey of 260 individuals and five focus groups with 43 participants. Among respondents, 75% were employees in the UD and 30% were students, of whom 80% were enrolled full-time. Overall, 76% had at least one child aged 12 or younger, 9% had a child with a disability or developmental delay, and 11% were single parents.



Most respondents reported difficulty accessing childcare for all age groups, with the greatest challenge being infant care. As a result, 77% said they had to work fewer hours than desired, and 94% of students felt their academic performance suffered. Seventy percent of all respondents said there is a high need for additional childcare in the University District.

While workforce shortages and wages remain the most significant barriers to childcare development in Spokane, the siting and development of facilities also pose challenges. A new proposal from Mayor Lisa Brown seeks to address this by streamlining the siting process for childcare facilities. Currently, the City of Spokane requires a costly conditional use permit for centers in some residential zones. Mayor Brown's proposal would eliminate this barrier, allowing childcare centers in all residential and commercial zones.

If adopted, this legislation would implement <u>Senate Bill 5509</u>, removing a significant barrier to expanding childcare access locally.
