



On September 6, I spent two hours at the House of Charity (HOC) alongside the Mithun team as they led a Focus Group with five HOC residents and five Catholic Charities Haven's residents. We gave an overview of the U District Conceptual Plan that is underway, we discussed their concerns, their needs, how they currently use services in the district, and what they would like to see happen in the future. Not surprisingly, many of their concerns, are our concerns



All of the residents are extremely concerned about the increased use of and access to drugs on the streets and expressed grief in losing many friends and neighbors to drugs these past few years.

All are concerned about the increase in garbage, drug paraphernalia, and human excrement on our sidewalks, and they feel increasingly unsafe walking around downtown. Many said they have seen an increase in anger in the homeless population over the past few years and that in many ways, the homeless should be held more accountable than they are today. They also stated that Spokane is an incredibly generous community and that no one should go hungry here.

While I am no expert on homelessness, I do know it's a crisis that's not possible to solve with a few easy, quick solutions. As a mid-sized city, Spokane has an extremely high level of poverty, domestic violence, and child abuse. All of this lends itself to a repeating cycle of generational trauma. The lack of affordable housing and the impact of cheap and dangerous drugs such as fentanyl only multiplies the pain families, neighbors, and businesses are experiencing.

For me, connecting with these folks, understanding our shared concerns, and seeing their faces light up when we talked about community gardens and increased green space, was an eye-opener. It also gave me a deep appreciation for everyone in our community working directly on these issues in a myriad of ways and at multiple levels, and a greater empathy for those both living in the center of it all and those lost on our streets.

To echo what was expressed at the Spokane Business Association's first annual dinner, we all need to come together across all divides and support

one another to address this crisis in a meaningful way. Supporting our local small businesses is paramount, as is supporting the human beings caught up in this tragedy.

Following are the key takeaways from the HOC and Haven's Focus Group:

- No place to feel welcome in public
- No place for the houseless to rest
- Lack of common courtesy in public
- Desire for more services related to drug addiction
- Improved access to services such as DSHS and Social Security offices
- Infrastructure such as benches, lighting, and trashcans is welcome
- Desire for more security in the University District
- Desire for more food sovereignty for residents of Havens and House of Charities to grow food; welcome the possibility of community gardens and opportunity to sell produce
- South UD needs more cover, shelter, trees, and shade protection
- More water features integrated into spaces that do not get overcrowded; include a spray element so people can cool down in the heat
